Chris Wright

Rev Dr Chris Wright is Global Ambassador and Ministry Director of Langham Partnership (www.langham.org).

After ordained pastoral ministry in Tonbridge, Kent, he taught the Old Testament in India for five years (1983-88) and then at All Nations



Christian College in England, where he was also Principal from 1993-2001. In 2001 he took over the leadership of the Langham ministries at the invitation of their founder, John Stott.

His books include commentaries on Exodus, Deuteronomy, Jeremiah, Lamentations and Ezekiel, Old Testament Ethics for the People of God; The Mission of God; The God I Don't Understand; and The Mission of God's People.

Chris was chair of the Lausanne Theology Working Group. (www.lausanne.org), from 2005 – 2011, and was the chief architect of *The Cape Town Commitment* – the statement of the Third Lausanne Congress in October 2010. He is an honorary Vice-President of Tearfund and IFES. Chris and his wife Liz, who come originally from Belfast, Northern Ireland, have four adult children and eleven grandchildren, and live in London as members of All Souls Church, Langham Place, where Chris serves as an honorary curate. Chris enjoys a bit of light running in Regent's Park, birdwatching when possible and following Ireland's fortunes in the rugby Six Nations.

What tips can you give to entrants addressing the theme of 'Welcome the Stranger'?

I will hope for sermons that recognise the prominence and importance of "the stranger / foreigner / outsider" in the biblical texts - in both O.T. and N.T. Israel traced their national epic back to having been aliens in Egypt, and were summoned never to forget what God did for them in that condition, and to reflect it in their attitudes and treatments of foreigners.

All Christians are "aliens and strangers" on earth in a sense. What does that say to our response to outsiders in our culture? I would look for some sensitive but sharp application of these themes to today's world, whether to national immigration policy, or simply care for "outsiders" of all kinds in local communities and cities, and indeed within our churches too. Somewhere I would be wanting to see the face of Jesus Christ shining through.

Dotha Blackwood

Born and educated in Jamaica, Dotha was converted in 1977.

She worked with the Jamaica Citizens Bank Ltd and International Accelerated Missions Bible School (IAM) in Kingston, Jamaica as Director, whilst freelancing as a drummer.



In 1993, Dotha moved to England as Director of the International Accelerated Mission's (IAM) Bible School in London, where she was also Church Leader with New Life Assembly at Dalston from 1994 to 1997 before becoming an Associate Minister at the Dulwich church.

Dotha is a Graduate of Spurgeon's College, achieving a Master's Degree in Christian Doctrine after successfully completing her BD there. She is also a product of the Jamaica School of Music, where she studied, played and taught drums and other percussion instruments.

Over the years Dotha has been Minister of Music and a worship leader at various conferences; she led many worship seminars and was choir director of a 100-voice choir for ten years. She continues to exercise her gifts of worship leading, preaching and teaching at various conferences, retreats, churches and Christian gatherings all over the world. Her interests include playing the drums, singing, listening to music, walking, playing tabletennis, pool/snooker, preaching, teaching and listening to audio books.

In 2011 Dotha moved from the south coast where she was a Lecturer in Theology and Biblical Studies, and Director of Practical Training at Moorland's College for 12 years. Current research interests include Transformative Learning, Pentecostal Spirituality, Theological Education and Ministerial Formation, Practical Theology and Learning Organizations. She supports Arsenal Football Club.

What tips can you give to entrants addressing the theme of 'Welcome the Stranger'?

One of the things I often say to folks thinking about sermon preparations, is that once they have identified the text from which they would be preaching, they should 'read themselves into the text'. By this I mean, it is often so easy for us to think with contemporary eyes, and thousands of years of hearing and/or reading the texts that we forget that when the original readers/hearers first heard these texts they were fresh, brand new and therefore at times deeply disturbing. So, I say try and imagine yourself back there, hearing, for example, the story of the 'Good Samaritan' and then (having acquainted yourself with the nature of the relationships between the various parties mentioned) re-read it again with those lenses and put yourself in their shoes.

I also always encourage listening to different translations of the text, as this sometimes also highlights nuances that may have been missed in reading one's familiar translation. Once one has geroed in on what Thomas Long calls the 'focus and the function' of the text and the sermon, one should always ask the 'so what?' question. What does any of this have to do with or say to me (i.e., our audience/s) today?

Once the sermon is then 'written', 'deliver the pizza'! We are just the pizza delivery boys and girls, and not responsible for the 'impacting' of the hearers - that's God's job.

Grants update: Anthony Parkinson

My name is Anthony Parkinson and I have recently completed my Graduate Diploma in Church Planting and Leadership with Westminster Theological Centre.

The course was a two-year part time course from which I successfully graduated. I chose the church planting stream as I was already involved in a church planting setting with a Christian rehab project where I served for many years after being saved myself and delivered from heroin addiction. Preaching Christ's message of hope has been key for me ever since as I can personally testify to its transforming power.

On my journey I have grown in my calling and my experience but studying at WTC really allowed me to add an academic dimension to what I was learning on the ground and to help me put my experience into words. I have found the study utterly transformational to my walk with Jesus, really helping me think and reflect on God's word for my context. I believe it had massively impacted my capacity to preach as well as I have covered all aspects of theology from biblical study and exegesis to systematics, politics, ethics, church history,

different perspectives in a new light.

The recent pandemic had a massive impact on our family as we moved right at the start of it to embark on a new ministry to lead a church where we didn't know anyone. That was especially hard due to the relational aspect of church leadership. In many ways it felt like my studies kept me sane as I had existing relationships at WTC and although it was online there was still a great sense

along with my experience has helped me see many

of community. I was also able to reflect deeply on the church and its role in times of crisis.

On the back of my success in my Graduate Diploma and some encouragement from WTC faculty including the principal, Dr Lucy Peppiatt, I have embarked on a journey into further study starting an MA in Kingdom Theology. As I write this, I am on my first residential. Studying God's word deeply in this way has ignited my passion

for knowledge, learning and the richness of the word. My position is unchanged and I require ongoing external support for my studies but it is also a great faith exercise as I grow in knowledge and get to exercise my faith and stretch it simultaneously.

Thank you so much for the grant given, it was utterly indispensable to enable my studies. Without it, along with the support of others, I would not have been able to pursue my studies. As a ministry family, like many others we survive on one income which barely makes ends

meet and to enable further activities, external support is always necessary. I am grateful to God that our needs are always met and LWPT has been a massive part of that in this last year. Your role as an enabler and a door opener for others is no small thing. I am deeply indebted to LWPT.

Book Review by Paula Gooder*

The Hour is Come: Passion in Real Time Andrew Nunn (SCM, 2021) 208pp, paperback RRP £12.99

Have you ever asked yourself, what day of the week the widow dropped her two coins into the temple treasury? Or when the disciples found

the man carrying the water jar, who would show them the way to the upper room? In this fascinating book of devotional reflections, Andrew Nunn has put together the well-known events of the last week of Jesus' life in a fresh and fascinating way. It starts





with the Saturday before Palm Sunday and ends at Pentecost.

The reflections focus in on key hours in the last week of Jesus' life, then week by week through the weeks after Easter and ending, finally, with three reflections on Pentecost Sunday.

Although we can't be sure exactly when each event happened, looking at the events in detail and reflecting on when they might have happened brings a fresh insight to the story. In particular, it allows us to appreciate the growing tension as Jesus' death comes ever closer and the slow realisation, in the hearts of Jesus' disciples, of what the resurrection meant.

Each section is very short — no longer than two pages long — and includes a passage from the Bible, some help into reflection and a prayer. It is a wonderful resource with so much to think about and reflect on. It will be well worth praying with in the lead up to Easter and beyond.

I highly recommend this book for anyone who would like to take time to get into the details of the story of Jesus' death and resurrection.


